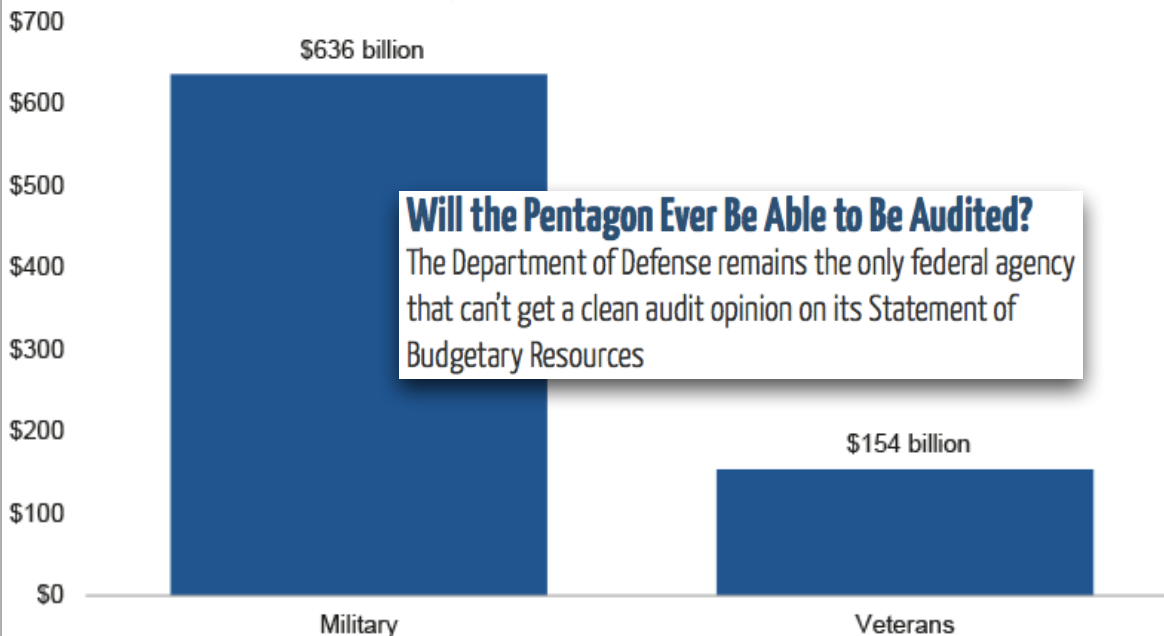

The problem is two-fold. First, there is the Pentagon acquisition system, which fails to deliver affordable and effective weapons on time. Then, this failed system is overseen by a Congress that rewards the waste with additional dollars for modernization at the cost of near- and medium-term readiness.

- 2. Boeing = \$31 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$29 million (198:1)
- 3. BAE Systems = \$29 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$4 million
- 4. General Dynamics = \$23 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$20 million (82:1)
- 5. Raytheon = \$22 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$11 million
- 6. Northrop Grumman = \$21 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$15 million (78:1)
- 7. Airbus Group = \$16 billion**
 - CEO compensation = \$7 million
